The Compassionate Friends (TCF) is a national nonprofit self-help organization that offers friendship, understanding and hope to bereaved parents, grandparents and siblings. There are no religious affiliations and no dues.

About Our Meetings...

Meetings are held 2nd Monday each month from 7 to 9 pm at Sacred Heart Hospital (2nd Flr. Conference Center), 4th & Chew Sts, Allentown. Free parking deck passes are available at the meeting.

Meetings are open to all bereaved parents, grandparents and mature siblings. Younger siblings may benefit from one of the children's bereavement groups listed below. Meetings vary, from sharing, to guest speakers, to special presentations. Separate sharing sessions are offered to new members. Participation in group sharing is confidential and voluntary. Our hope is that being among other bereaved parents you may feel free to talk, cry and share, but it is okay to just come and listen too.

We invite you to bring a picture of your child to display at the meeting for their birth or anniversary month or at any time.

To Our New Members

Making the decision to come to your first meeting can be difficult. It can also be difficult to return for a second or third meeting, but we ask that you attend three meetings before deciding whether or not TCF will work for you. We cannot walk your grief journey for you, but we can take your hand and walk beside you if you allow us to. We have no easy answers or quick fixes, but we care, share and understand. Although our members circumstances may be different, we have all "been there"...we are all grieving the loss of a child and therefore we can truly say we understand. You are not alone.

Important Information For Our Readers

The Island of Misfit Parents



Continuing Reminders of Your Loss: Coping with the Holidays

- Decide on how much of the holiday you can or want to handle and modify your traditions. Writing out greeting cards, for example, may be too much. In that case, pass them up this year. or at least trim your list down. If decorations are more than you can handle, put up what you can or ask for help from family.
- If shopping is too difficult, try giving cash, gift cards or ordering gifts from a catalog or online.
- Once you have thought the holiday through, have a conference with family members and or friends to let them know your plans and to hear theirs. Be prepared to compromise a bit to reach a plan that everyone can accept.
- You may decide to honor or your loved one by having a photo of him/her in a special place decorated
 with evergreens and brightly colored ornaments. Or perhaps a miniature tree could be purchased-and
 decorations added every year in his/her memory. Let your family know your idea and get their input.
- Know that there still may be friends who have not heard of your loved one's death and you may receive a Christmas card addressed to them or asking about him/her.
- Allow yourself time to think about and acknowledge your grief and realize your holiday may have both happy and sad moments.
- If others in your family are willing, take time out to talk about your loved one who has died.
- Set limits for yourself. Grief is exhausting work and you need to have quiet time to rest and to reflect.
- Be careful with excessive use of alcohol and overeating they can make you depressed.
- Some people elect to do something very different on the first Christmas without their loved one, something so different that the absence of the loved one won't be so obvious, maybe even going to a totally different place. People then often return to old traditions the following year perhaps developing some new traditions to add to the old.
- You may decide to work on the holiday if you have this option, giving a co-worker a chance to spend the holiday with his or her family.
- You may decide to do volunteer work on this day such as working in a hospital or with the homeless.
- Think of a response you can use to the greeting, "Merry Christmas" or "Happy New Year.
- The religious services of Christmas can be reassuring, or they can be upsetting. 'Think how they would affect you and then decide what would be best for you as far as attending or not attending them.
- Plan something you can look forward to after the holiday in January or February to lessen the postholiday letdown and as reward for getting through them.
- Look for a lecture or workshop on how to cope with the holidays .
- Remember the anticipation of a holiday is often harder than the actual day.
- If you find the stress, anxiety and loneliness too overwhelming, it is always ok to reach out for help. Contact your clergy, a good friend or a professional.

A Grandparent's Holiday Dilemma

A difficult part of being a bereaved grandparent at the holiday time is that we are expected to be all things to all our children. To those who have healthy and complete families we are expected to share in their joy. To our bereaved child we are expected to understand, empathize and, above all, be aware of the special difficulty the holidays bring for them. We are put in the middle between our children, happy families on one side, and a sad one on the other. In addition, we have our own pain to deal with.

It seems to me that this is an impossible situation and frequently we are expected to do the impossible, but I don't think we can, nor do I think we should try. Because I am a bereaved parent myself and I have experienced that special grief, I know my bereaved daughter's second Christmas without her Emily will be a hard one, maybe even harder than the first one. It will be especially hard for her because this year my oldest son and his (complete) family will come from Minneapolis to St. Louis for Christmas. He has three little ones; the oldest is the same age that Emily would be. Seeing Bob's children, especially Robbie, will remind Dorothy even more that Emily will not be physically a part of our holidays.

For weeks I have been tormented with thoughts on how I will handle this situation. Will I act at the holidays in a way that will make my son happy, or in ways that will be supportive of my daughter? Granted, there will be separate times when I can be happy that my son and his family are here and happy to see my grandchildren, whom I don't see often; and there will be a time when I can be totally supportive of my bereaved daughter. But this will not be possible for all the time, especially on Christmas Day. I have decided that, as hard as it may be to do. I must make a choice between them this year, and I choose to be supportive of my bereaved daughter. This may sound unfair, but is it? When our children were younger, weren't there

times, such as when one was sick and needed our special attention, didn't we give it to them, oft times to the neglect of the others? This didn't mean we loved the sick child more than the others. It simply meant that the sick one needed us more than the others at that time. Our bereaved child is experiencing the most pain he/she

will ever experience in his/her life and right now, needs us more.

Unfortunately, our child with the complete family may resent our attention to the bereaved child and feel neglected maybe even hurt, and for that we are sorry, but our child who has not lost a child has not experienced the constant pain and hurt our bereaved child has for a year or longer. We cannot let ourselves be too concerned that he/she may feel neglected or hurt for a few days.

I woke up from this dream crying to find Sean sitting next to my bed. He was shaking me awake and asking me what was wrong. I told Sean I had a horrible dream. I told him every detail of my dream. He laughed at me and gave me a hug. Then Sean said to me, "How can I be dead? I'm right here with you!" Then we both started laughing. I woke from that dream laughing with Sean. I felt so good. Then I realized that I had dreamed the last part. When I realized that, I was so angry.

Even after seven years, the pain, the anger, and the hoping are still there. Even though the pain and anger don't come as often for me, it is still there and I know it's okay. Just like I know that I'm not crazy or dumb for holding on to the hope. I do realize that Sean is gone and the only place I will see him for a long time is in my dreams. I know that he loved me and always will and that he is with me every day. All I can do is welcome him into my dreams.

Sometimes we will need the support of our friends.


At other times we need our families to be there.
