I have been trying to make the best of grief and am just beginning to learn to allow it to make the best of me.

# The Pain of Losing a Child

I've never suffered a gunshot wound, but I've read that If you remain awake after being shot, you don't feel anything at first Just numb. Then suddenly, a sensation of overwhelming cold or heat followed quickly by unbearable pain.

How similar is this to parental grief? When our child first dies, we are mercifully cushioned by 'shock'. We are numb, unfeeling. We make decisions and follow rituals without thought but at some point, the shock wears off. Some of us experience this gradually, while some of us feel the change in the blink of an eye. My shock wore off gradually, but when it did, I felt cold. My hands and feet felt like I had been shoveling snow in a swimsuit I felt my blood rush through my veins, aware of it as never before, because it was so cold. Suddenly Shelly's death hit me. The icy fingers of terror squeezed my heart so hard, I thought It would explode. My heart didn't explode - but as I warmed up, it hurt. My head hurt, my arms, legs, liver, heart, intestines, mind, toes, my everything hurt. The pain was like none I had ever felt before. I felt that the pain had invaded my every pore. Each cell of my body felt ready to burst.

As a gunshot wound heals, the pain slowly recedes. There is work to do. Continued medical treatment may be needed. Rehabilitation progresses. Then there is a scar. It hurts sometimes for no reason at all. It hurts sometimes because we bang it. It hurts sometimes because we think about the cause of the scar. It hurts sometimes because we see someone else wounded by a bullet

How similar is this to parental grief? As our grief progresses, our pain does ease. It takes a long time. Hard work is required. Continued help from private counselors, support groups or friends and family may be needed. Then one day, the pain isn't the first thing to come to mind when we wake up In the morning. As a gunshot victim one morning awakens, stretches and doesn't feel immediate pain, we begin the day without tears. But, by the time lunch rolls around, the gunshot victim's body is sore from use, because It is not fully healed, and our entire being hurts because our soul and heart are sore from the effort of surviving without our child.

Then, eventually, though it sometimes seems as though it will never happen, there is a scar. It hurts sometimes for no reason at all. It hurts sometimes because an insensitive word from another bangs it. It hurts sometimes because we just plain miss our child. It hurts sometimes because it is an especially painful time of year. It hurts sometimes because we see undeserving parents having children they don't want or appreciate. It hurts sometimes because we see a child sick or injured or killed in the same way our child was. It hurts sometimes because we see that ice-cold-terror-aguish-realization-that-my-child-is-dead look in another parent's eyes. And sometimes it doesn't hurt at all, and we live.

"People spend as much energy in one day of grief as if they dug ditches for an 8 hour shift"

# Coping with Grief during the Holidays

Halloween barely passes before stores stock their shelves with holiday decorations. Christmas carols echo through shopping malls, and the first of the holiday commercials hits the airwaves. If you've lost a loved one, these can be stark reminders that the holidays won't be the same. Whether your loved one died recently or decades ago, the holidays bring forth powerful memories that may trigger your grief. If the person died on or near a holiday, the two events are forever linked and may be particularly painful, especially if you have unresolved feelings about the lost relationship.

When trying to cope with grief, it's important to understand that grief is cumulative. We don't experience a Loss, move through predetermined emotional stages, then emerge on the other side. Steve Moeller, director of community services and grief recovery outreach program at Floral Haven Funeral Home and Memorial Gardens in Broken Arrow, Okla., says grief is more like adding rocks into a backpack. Each loss, be it a death, divorce or a move away from family and friends, is packed in like another rock; some bigger than others. When grief is unresolved, one of these emotional rocks may come tumbling out of the backpack when we least expect it. And it may come out inappropriately, in the form of road rage, substance abuse or lashing out verbally or physically.

This holiday season, if the first Christmas card you open or the first "Happy Hanukkah!" you hear rips a rock from your backpack, use that opportunity to work through your feelings. Don't just shove it back in the pack. Here are some tips to help you cope.

#### DO:

- Expect to have some pain. When the feelings come, let them.
- Accept a few invitations to be with close family or friends. Choose the ones that sound most appealing at the time and avoid the ones that feel more like obligation.
- ❖ Talk about your feelings. Let people know if you're having a tough day.
- ❖ Incorporate your loved one into the holidays: x Share your favorite stories over dinner.
- ❖ Make a toast or light a candle in remembrance.
- Make a donation in his or her name
- Help others: Take a meal to a homebound couple.
- \* Modify or make new traditions if it feels right. Just remember to include others who are grieving, in the decision.
- \* If the idea of holiday shopping overwhelms you, buy gifts online or through catalogs.
- Replace negative thoughts with positive ones. The National Funeral Directors Association suggests affirmations such as, "In spite of loss, will try to enjoy this season."
- Prepare yourself for January. Sometimes the aftermath of the holidays can bring more sadness than the holidays themselves.

The August 2004 The Morning Call Newspaper invited persons to submit what the song "FREE BIRD" meant to them in their lives. This was my daughter Teresa's e-mail entry. Submitted by Carol Newell, TCF Lehigh Valley Chapter

#### WHAT FREE BIRD MEANS TO ME

To start off, the song itself rocks!!... but it is far more than just a cool song to me. If anything, the song is a memory for me, embedded in my mind of my beloved brother Scott, who passed away April 28Th, 1996. 'Free bird' was one of his favorite songs to play on the jukebox. The words expressed in the song are as if he was singing it himself. The first several years during my family's grieving process, the song tended to upset us at times. However, now-a-days, when it comes on the radio, we turn it up and find comfort in our beliefs that he's nearby, even though we don't see him. The one verse in the song says "If I leave here tomorrow, would you still remember me?" In regards to my brother, who was the best and greatest friend to me, my reply is I could never forget you, EVER!

I loved him like no other, I adored him & cherish his life in my heart, mind, and soul. He had such an influence on me as a person, and when I was 17 years old he chose to end his life; he was only 22. He truly was a masterpiece of the human soul. It's only unfortunate for the people who didn't get the opportunity to have a wonderful person like my Scott in their lives, cause he truly was an angel in disguise who touched everyone's heart with his caring, sensitive, funny ways. I've seen him give the shirt off his back to someone who needed it more. That's the kind of genuine person this world needs more of. Sadly enough, it's the greatest beings of the world who don't think as highly of themselves as they should. With the life of turmoil he struggled with as a young abused child, I've only grown older to feel helpless. There was nothing anyone could do to help him. Obviously, he'd run out of energy when it came time again for him to realize that he counted too. I wish he could've only given himself the love and patience that he poured out to everyone else. He meant everything to me, and I don't stand alone on that fact. My brother Scott is my 'Free Bird', and I firmly desire to know that he really is safely home now, in a place where he knows he's loved and appreciated. I find peace in my mind knowing he's no longer hurting inside. I miss him terribly, and will always yell 'Free Bird' (in his honor) at a concert or open mike night. It makes me feel as if I'm doing something for him, since he's no longer here to do it for himself. Yelling out 'Free Bird', or simply turning the song up on the radio, is my way of saying to him, "I'm thinking of you." Whenever I hear the song, I feel it's his way of letting me know he's sitting there watching over me; protecting me like he always did. Another verse that sticks out to me in the song is, "I can't change," and I've gritted and grinded my teeth and held back tears, because those are simple words for anyone else, but happen to be my cruel, harsh reality. Every year since his suicide, when I blow out my birthday candles, I wish to myself "Wish you were here." I guess I need to be more honest with myself, to just accept the fact that he's gone off into the big world in his own way most comfortable for him, which is by becoming a 'Free Bird' soaring in the sky free - free from hurt; free from the government, which he detested; free from the unfairness this world is made up of. He was loved so much, by so many... his pain and sorrow took that away from him. For those who knew and loved him, we can only accept this tragedy in one way...by putting our grief of losing him aside, and fill our minds and souls with the knowledge that he is happy now, and not hurting anymore.

He was the most beautiful 'Free bird' in the world. Love, Peace & Happiness always be with you Scott. Love, Teresa Newell, aka Terry
