The pain we feel is almost constant for many months, but there are times when it completely overwhelms us. At these times, we can do nothing but pace and wail. We wring our hands. Our bodies tremble with agony and despair. We feel regret; wishing to the depth of our souls that we could redo the yesterday when our child died. We feel intense longing for our child, so intense we don't believe we can stand it another minute. We feel completely alone. It is as though no one exists in this world but us. Between sobs, phrases like "My God, I can't go on", "What am I going to do?" or "It hurts so badly", comes out of our mouths over and over again. We feel as though we are at the bottom of a deep pit and there is no way out. We feel consumed with an indescribable anguish.

It is at these times we might be advised by those around us to "calm down" or to "control ourselves." It is my opinion that that is exactly what we should not do.

Mistakenly, I tried to "control" my emotions after Arthur died, but when I could "control" no longer, my grief would pour out of me in a raging torrent. I noticed that for days after one of these sessions, I felt a great release of pressure, but never did realize that these wailing sessions were helpful and healing.

Every emotion carries with it energy. Sadness, anger, guilt, regret are with us constantly in our grief, but the energy caused by them cannot be released as it builds. It is like a tea kettle. The water is constantly boiling . . . but it is in spurts that the steam pushes itself out the lid. The uncontrolled crying session is the steam of our boiling emotions forcing itself out. As with the lid on the tea kettle, these sessions are our safety valves.


These sessions can last from a few minutes to over an hour. They are self-terminating and they are exhausting. After such a session, we are worn out just as we would be after hard physical exercise. Sometimes, we can even sleep after them. Early in our grief, they may be frequent, but as time goes on and you allow yourself to experience them and not try to inhibit them, they will become farther apart.

Don't take the advice of those around you to "get hold of yourself". On the contrary, surrender

yourself to your pain. Cry. Wail. Rant. Wring your hands. Voice your anger, your guilts, your regrets. Expend your pent-up emotions. You will feel much better afterwards


Everything we do

As a guest speaker some years ago **Donna Falk** of the Falk Funeral Homes addressed *Handling the Holidays*. She said that there are big ones Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years that are approaching and everyone is wrapped up in preparation for. We need to decide how we will celebrate. It may be very different than what we have done in the past. That is perfectly all right. There are the smaller ones like Valentine's Day, Mother's Day and Memorial Day that are also difficult. Finally, there are what she called the personal ones - anniversaries, birthdays, graduations, etc. that other people may not recognize, but may be very difficult for grieving parents and families. She stated that the key to handling all these times is to have a plan, let family and friends know your plan and to stick to that plan. She gave us this list of helpful hints.

Coping With Holidays

After the loss of someone close to us, it often seems like our lives have been turned upside down. Nothing is the same. To complicate matters, sooner or later, we all have to face the holidays. Holidays are the cornerstone of traditions -of sameness throughout the years.

Several books and videos are available that help to enable and empower us to explore our options during these difficult times. One of the best is a video, entitled "A Ray of Hope." Following are some helpful hints from the video.

Set Boundaries on Expectation

Decide what you will and won't or can't do at the holidays. Do you want to carry on as usual, or do you want to do things differently? It's OK to admit either. Claim your space -but let others help you with those tasks you feel would be painful. Admit your fears about the upcoming events.

Tell Your Friends and Family Your Thoughts

Have a family meeting before the holidays to discuss what your needs and expectations are. Share your feelings - and encourage others to share theirs as well. Set the stage for common meaning and understanding. But remember - everyone grieves differently. Not everyone will need or want to do the same thing. If you cannot have a meeting, talk to family members individually or write a letter to them explaining your feelings. Say what you want, and say what you need.

Rehearse How To Respond To Situations

You may already know that there are events or places that you must absolutely go to. Rehearse in your mind what you are going to say to others, especially if it is a situation that you are uncomfortable with. Write down your feelings and your responses. Say them out loud. Visualize the situation with a positive outcome. What are your fears about the situation? Write them down and address them.

Use the Holidays as an Opportunity for Healing "A Holy Day" for Self-Renewal

Observe the day in a way that has meaning for you, nurture yourself. Go outside. Create a day of rest and relaxation. Take a bath, sleep late, go for a bike ride. Physical activity is a great stress reliever. Do not feel that you even have to acknowledge the day if you do not want to. Do something special just for you.

Honor Your Emotional Life

Use the experience to release pent up anger and

anxieties. Write in a journal. Share what's in your heart and mind. Try to have at least one person, whether a friend, relative, or a counselor who you can talk to.

Connect to the Spiritual

Do not forget your spiritual side. Pray. Meditate. Visit a church, synagogue or another place that lifts your spirit. Light a candle. Release a balloon. Cry. Reconnect to Laughter. Do something to remind you that you are a part of a greater whole.

Be Flexible

Be open to surprises. Have a plan, but remember that nothing is written in stone.

Be Open to Signs

There are those things that happen that make us sure that our loved one is near—a bird flying over at the right time, the chime of bells. Accept these signs, no matter how small and be thankful.

Be Creative

It's OK to change tradition. Start something new. Make a new holiday. Bring special touches that remind you of your loved one to the holiday. Start a memory tree. Or go away. Go somewhere new and different - go on vacation. Keep busy.

Gifts and Gift Giving

No one can take away the deepness and richness that your loved one gave to you. Be thankful for that gift. Give others gifts that remind you of your loved one. Give simple gifts. Make them. Give photos. Get yourself a gift.

Have a Plan

Most importantly, have a plan. Sometimes anticipating the event is far worse then the day itself. Listen to that small voice inside yourself that tells you what you need and DO IT.
