Sat. June 17th-TCF Family Picnic and Memorial Balloon Release -12 Noon at Moore Township Rec Center, Bath, PA



The Garden of Grieving

When Allison was killed in May 2001, the summer months that followed were merely a blur, other than the intense agony of days and nights filled with seemingly non -stop crying that literally took my breath away and plummeted me to near unconsciousness for lack of oxygen in my lungs.

I have no recollection of how the lawn and garden fared that year. I was non-functional both physically and mentally. I was hospitalized because I wanted to kill myself to be with my beloved 19-year-old daughter whose life was obliterated by a drunk driver convicted of homicide and now incarcerated.

When I attended The Compassionate Friends support group meetings, I wanted to deck any parent who

remarked that I would survive and even find joy again in my life. "What a betrayal to my Allison," I thought, "to not grieve for the rest of my life." My definition of grief was non-stop crying and despair. It was my badge of honor for her.

My grieving is a life sentence, but it has ever changing definitions these days. It evolves from day to day, week to week, month to month and year to year. And so too does my recovery.

The following year's Spring, I was angered by the new blooms of the crocus and the Iris. How dare they come alive and not my daughter. I stomped on a few blooms and then, of course, felt guilty. I didn't care about the unkempt yard and the garden vacant of flowers and vegetables. Yet, at the cemetery, I visited Allison's grave almost daily to literally dust her monument, pull weeds and even trim the grass with a pair of sewing scissors. Other bereaved parents didn't find that odd, but I got alarmed stares from everyone else.

Last Spring and summer, I ached when new blooms emerged, but I didn't stomp on them. From two prior years of neglect, weeds and tall grasses invaded the yard. Somewhere deep within me, I had the energy to buy a weed wacker and tackle the unwelcomed weeds with a vengeance. And I didn't stop at my own property. I wacked my way onto neighboring properties, including those where no one lived. I spewed epithets at the weeds followed by soggy and dirt-caked cheeks from the tears. In hindsight, it had nothing to do with unwanted weeds and everything to do with the anger and rage in my heart and soul. I couldn't kill the drunk driver, but I could kill the weeds. I would be exhausted, but I always felt better afterwards.

I had never consciously acknowledged the anger within me, but my mind and body did. Anger is seldom

acknowledged or recognized as part of the grieving process. Few recognize it within themselves. And even fewer talk about it. I wasn't only angry at the person who caused my child's death, I was also angry at Allison for "leaving me." Even fewer bereaved parents acknowledge the anger with their own deceased child. Your child doesn't have to die as the result of someone's criminal or negligent action for you to be angry. Anger is as real a part of grieving a child's death as is the son ow, the tears, the chest pain, the anxiety and the depression.

This year's Spring and Summer arrived with mixed feelings. The anniversary of Allison's death was on Mother's Day. I cried long and hard with the sorrow of missing Allison, but I also cried tears of love and adoration for my two surviving children; Ashley and Elliot. I had learned to risk love again and feel its healing effect on my heart and soul.

I saw a solitary flower bloom that had never bloomed before on our property. I was captivated by its bright color and the silky softness of its petals. It reminded me of Allison's vibrance, her ability to stand alone and her thick soft hair. I thanked God and Allison for the gift and, of course, I cried again.

This year, my yard and my flower gardens are vibrantly alive....and weed-free. Spending hours working the soil and planting the seeds are just as rewarding as whacking the weeds. As I nurture my plants, so too do I nurture the love in my heart for Allison .The physical exertion and the beauty of my efforts also nurture my heart and soul as I let the tears flow and the smiles grow. My children say it is Allison who helps me till the soil and plant the seeds of new life in memory and honor of her and the beauty of her enduring love for us.

"Wow, your yard and garden have come a long way," my neighbor remarked.

"Yes, indeed," I responded. And so too have I.

Father's Day is often a forgotten holiday, overshadowed by the longer-standing tribute to mothers. But for the bereaved father it is a poignant reminder of bitter sweetness. Sweet in the memory of a loved, now lost, child; bitter for the death and pain and recognition of inability to stop what happened. Fathers do not often have a chance to share their hurts and concerns. Oftentimes they are unable to do so, a remnant of childhood learning's about the strength and stoicism of "big boys." A father may be uncomfortable opening up to his wife, and the wife who pushes him to talk may be pushing too hard.

Father's Day does not have to be a time when everyone pours out of the woodwork to say, "I'm sorry we haven't talked. Let's do it now." But it can be a time when the family gives Dad a hug, does something special, helps with the chores, and mostly, lets him know how important and needed and loved he is. It is some of these things that he has lost with the death of a child.

And, like Mother's day, the day set aside for fathers does not have to be limited to a Sunday in June. It can be any day and every day.

For both holidays there is the religious aspect and how to deal with it. But, also for both holidays there is "the children's hour," so to speak. For Easter there have always been the Easter Parade, Easter eggs, and the Easter Bunny. For Passover, there have been matzah, the Seder with the recitations of the Four Questions, and with the participation of the youngest child.

So, again, what to do? Both Easter and Passover are holidays in which children are strongly involved. To see that empty chair at the table, to know that missing child is no longer with us, can be devastating, especially after the first or second anniversary of the death. At our house we have made a ritual to remember our son at the beginning of the Passover Seder. Please handle these holidays anyway you can. There are no rules. Do it your way.
