The mission of TCF is to assist families toward the positive resolution of grief following the death of a child of any age and to provide information to help others be supportive. The secret to TCF's success is simple: As seasoned grievers reach out to the newly bereaved, energy that has been directed inward begins to flow outward and both are helped to heal. The vision of TCF is that everyone who needs us will find us and everyone that finds us will be helped.

About Our Meetings...

The Lehigh Valley Chapter meets monthly on the 2nd Monday from 7 to 9 pm at Sacred Heart Hospital (2nd Flr. Conference Center), 4th & Chew Sts, Allentown. Free parking deck passes are available at the meeting.

Monthly meetings are open to all bereaved parents, grandparents and mature siblings (those old enough to understand the meeting discussions and not be upset by them). We currently do not have a sibling group, but Ryan's Tree (contact information is provided on the bottom of this page) offers bereavement groups for siblings ages 5 thru 18.

Meetings vary each month, from sharing, to guest speakers, to special presentations. Separate sharing sessions are offered to new members. Participation in group sharing is confidential and voluntary. It is our hope that being among other bereaved parents you may feel free to talk, cry and share your feelings, but it is okay to just come and listen too.

The chapter maintains an extensive free lending library of grief-related materials that is set up at meetings. Donations of grief-related books are always welcome.

We invite you to bring a picture of your child to display at the meeting for their birth or anniversary month or at any time. We also welcome refreshments brought in honor of your child.

Strange Words: Welcome New Members

I am always amazed at the instant empathy we each feel as new members come to their first meeting. We have the strangest welcome for these parents: "We are so sorry you have to be here."

In other organizations the questions are probing: where did you go to school, where do you work, where do you live? All designed to "size up" the newcomer, put him or her in the proper perspective of a neatly ordered world. For us, this information is meaningless. We know the world isn't neat and orderly; we discovered that when we lost our children. We care about you, the newly bereaved parent, whose life was tossed into a cosmic blender when your child died. We care because we are you. We have been here a while, in this purgatory of pain. We have learned to live our lives in a different way, to place value on understanding and hope, the intangibles of the purest meanings of life. We have learned to value each other, to reach out and talk, to wait patiently during the silences needed to form thoughts. We listen intently as you quietly say your child's name, tell your child's story, speak of your heartbreak.

Yes, this is a different kind of welcome. But it is the most deeply sincere welcome we will ever receive. We are kindred souls, you and I. Each of us lives in the "after death" world of losing our child. Each of us has learned gradually that the hope we have attained has made life better, lessened the pain, moderated the isolation, tears, emotional devastation and pure mayhem that once overtook us. Each of us has learned this slowly, in our own time and in our own way.

Each month new parents who have suffered the most horrific loss that a human can endure are welcomed into our group. We reach out, we listen with our hearts and we remember.

I cry when a tear rolls down your cheek. I agonize when you weep. I know that you question. I know that you pray. That you scream at night in your sleep. I'm aware of your quavering voice when you speak. of your blank, straightforward stare. I know of your pain, your depression, your guilt. That you search for "a face" everywhere. I watch as you walk with your head bowed low, With despair written over your face. I hear the quick sigh, the internal cry, I see how you search for a sign, for some hope, That the light will still shine in your life. I know how you live, I know that you die From the harsh words that wound like a knife. I empathize most with your loneliness now, Even though you're not always alone. Reflections on March

In March, it is as if the higher powers know we need to be shaken out of the lethargy of winter, awakened, prepared for growth.

Winter is again almost behind us although the hardwoods very stubbornly hold onto the last leaves of autumn. Is there a power of nature that knows that the tree, the plants, and we humans are still within our lethargy, fixed in modes of inactivity, semi-dormant, and like all sleepers, resentful of rough disturbance?

Is there a knowledge that remembers the need for all things to bend, lest they break? March "comes in like a lion" and "leaves like a lamb." Perhaps we have a primordial need for the shake the month gives us each spring, and the ensuing lamb is only arresting lion, all work done for this period of renewal.

Suddenly the peaceful quiet of winter days is much disturbed by violent wind gusting! Stark limbs are pushed to strive and snap back against a still gray sky. The hanger-on, the last dead leaves, are torn from their resting places, as if the stark trees are told there must be room for new growth! Neighbors complain as the wind moves all trash, seemingly deposits it where it knows it will be cleared. March is not a gentle month, but perhaps it is the most playful of, all months, a very young month! March is as playful as an adolescent child, a big friendly puppy, an awkward kitten.

What message does an ancient tree receive when it's limbs are flung against the sky, repeatedly exercised, threatened with severe harm, and small wounds cause the flow of healing juices? What happens to the roots in their winter sleep when shaken by the wind-flung tree?

March roars in like a lion, but no great harm results. March rages like an upset mother, but we know that she loves us. March is playful. March rests, and storms again in case we again sleep. March cleans the trees, moves the dead leaves, rearranges all trash, and knows we will complain and clean it all again. It takes will, caring, and health to complain. March laughs, and all of us

who forgot how to laugh are reminded. Laughter is healthy. Playful is cheerful. Confusion awakens us. Storm threats alert us.

Every year March rages, rests, upsets, moves, surprises, and repeats its lively repertoire; adolescent, out of sequence, full of surprise. Bare trees flail against the sky. The waters of the lake are roiled. New plants are rudely pushed about. Old ones are roughly awakened by the boisterous side of nature. March is the exuberant one of all the months. March insures that, ready or not, we will greet the renewal of nature, new growth, new challenge. We are simply not allowed to hide in our comfortable "rut." March is a month that refuses to be ignored. We are thrown out of the comfort of the winter shell. March's message seems to be "ready or not, it's time to be alive again."

We Compassionate Friends all seem to go through a period of dormant life and growth as we struggle to assimilate our great losses. With the passage of time, there is then a period of renewal, of interest in life, and an ability to accept new growth, new tasks, and life's challenges, awareness that we can leave some of our cold winter behind us.

Even in deep grief we, too, seem to come out of our lethargy and be cheered by the renewal so apparent in spring. we hope that you, this year will enjoy the gusting winds of March and be stirred and cheered by March's playful prelude to the coming spring.

So many times after our son died, I found myself asking questions. Where has he gone? Is there really life after death? Is there really a Heaven? Was his life with us worth anything?

I read. I talked to people. I prayed. I cried. I became depressed and I yelled at my God. Then I found Elizabeth Kubler Ross's book, "On Children and Death." She responded to a mother's letter and shared her wisdom and experience. She told that grieving mother (and through her, me) that out of her pain - if she chooses - comes a great amount of compassion, increased understanding and wisdom, and love for others who are in pain. It is her choice whether out of tragedy comes blessing or a curse, compassion or bitterness.

She concluded her letter with these words: "I want you to know that our research in death and life after death has revealed beyond a shadow of a doubt that those who make the transition are more alive, more surrounded with unconditional love and beauty than you can ever conceive. They are not really dead. They have just preceded us in the evolutional journey all of us are on; they are with their former playmates (as they call them), or quardian angels; they are with family members who proceeded them in death and are unable to miss you as you miss them since they are unable to feel any negative feelings. The only thing that stays with them is the knowledge of love and care that they have received and of the lessons they learned in their physical life.

BIRTHDAYS....

Listening and talking with many bereaved parents, a question often comes up - what to do on birthdays? Birthdays can be a time of sadness, when we remember that there was never a first birthday, the candles blown out with glee, the family get-together, and the time making sure we have chosen the card that is just right. Below are suggestions from bereaved parents, and what they have done on birthdays.

- 1. Visit the cemetery.
- A memorial notice in the newspaper and/or newsletter.
- 3. Donate a toy or book in memory of your child to your local school library or community library, community centre, hospital, kindergarten, toy library or even The Compassionate Friends library.
- 4. Bake or buy a birthday cake.
- 5. If you have candles on the birthday cake, allow the wind to blow them out.
- 6. Light a special remembrance candle for the day.
- 7. Buy the birthday card you would have bought.
- 8. Write in the card your feelings.
- Buy a small gift and donate it to a worthy cause, or give it to someone who is special In your life.
- 10. Plant a tree, shrub or flower in your garden or donate it to a school, community center or the local park.
- 11. Visit a special friend.
- 12. Help someone in need that day, e.g. meals on wheels, Red Cross.
- 13. Have a picnic lunch, or just sit quietly in a place special to your child.

- 14. Write a letter to your child and address it to "Cloud 9".
- 15. Have a special dinner either at home or out, that may include some favorite food of your child.
- 16. Write down memories of the time leading up to, and including the birth of your child.
- 17. Write memories of the "other" birthdays 1 minute old, 1 day old, 1 week old, etc.

These suggestions are in memory of the many children that I have learned to know through their mums and dads.

Do you have any other suggestions we could offer? What about 1st, 13th, 18th, 21st and 50th birthdays?

Everything is a first. Many moments must be faced. There are the first holidays, the first anniversary, the first birthday. Thoughts about my brother Dave will always be with us. It's never more than a sentence away from me . . . NEVER!

The ordinary cannot be ordinary. A certain phrase, a look, or an article of clothing can trigger thoughts and emotions. The joy of my senior year in college was interrupted by sad reality. FORGET? How is this possible?

The days and months following my brother's death were filled with grief. Flowers and food were everywhere—love and concerns were translated into strength that kept me moving one step at a time. People don't know what to say—nothing is NORMAL.

Tragedy has brought a seriousness to my life. Thoughts about the meaning of life and the unimportance of a lot of things I have previously found important are circulating in my mind. People ask me "How are you?" Here is my answer: "I am mad Dave died at the age of 17. I am angry that my parents have to go through this. I am confused about my role in the family. I am jealous of other families. I am sad. I am fearful about the future. I am hopeful things will get better. I am courageous. I think about my brother every day. I will be strong."
