Our hope is that being among other bereaved parents you may feel free to talk, cry and share, but it is okay to just come and listen too.

A Stiff Upper Lip Causes Wrinkles

The next time someone tells you to... "keep a still upper lip", tell them I said it causes wrinkles.

Bereaved parents will generally say that losing their child has "aged" them. I used to have a baby face. Into my late twenties, I still couldn't buy alcohol without showing my driver's license. When I married, inherited two children from my husband's first marriage. I used to get a kick out of telling people I had teenage children, and wait for the flabbergasted protestations to follow.

I was 33 when Nicholas died; I'm 36 now. Lately, when I tell people I have a 20-year-old daughter, no one bats an eyelash! Certainly no protestations - not even a "My, you must have started young!" More like an "Oh, that's nice." How old do I look anyway? What happened to me in those three years? I have a theory; that we don't get lines in our faces and gray in our hair and stress-related illnesses from the time we spend thinking about our child, crying and freely expressing our hurt and anger and guilt. We get them from the time we spend trying NOT to. Because we feel we cannot or should not break down before co-workers, friends, acquaintances, and many times, even family, we keep that upper lip as stiff as possible, and all of our emotions reined in as tightly as possible. Kept up long enough, without any release, and our faces will take on that pinched look and the gut finally protests with a message of it's own.

It's not that I seriously care about whether or not I have wrinkles or gray hair. I mean, comparatively speaking, it's a minor occurrence. The point is, that the outside tells the story of what's going on inside. I wish sometimes we could take "before & after" pictures at TCF meetings. Many times someone has walked into a meeting for the first time, and I've found out later that person is much younger than I thought. Several months down the road, after sharing their child and expressing their grief, I'll notice a change, the same person looks 10 years younger than his or her actual age. Grief is a very physical emotion. We should not keep it inside us, it shows.

Think of how you really feel when you finally let golet the tears fall freely, or let the rage out by screaming or beating a pillow. The face softens and the body relaxes. It exhausts us. Cure for sleepless nights? Don't wait until bedtime to do your griefwork. Grief needs to be expressed and released. There will always be situations where we feel it appropriate to keep our emotions in check. That's fine. But, also, remember to do your grief-work whenever you can. It's the most important thing you can do right now for your future.

So the next time someone tells you to keep a stiff upper lip, simply say, "Did you know that causes wrinkles?" and walk away. They'll be confused, but that's okay... you know what you're doing.



Here we go again, that downward spiral into Fall that every bereaved parent dreads. For as sure as we turn the calendar page to October, here comes Halloween, followed by Thanksgiving and then (Oh No!) Christmas/Hanukkah. As I contemplate my fourth fall without my child, I can tell that the pain will be less intense and come less often. This does not mean I love her less. It just means that no one can grieve as intensely as in the beginning for very long. Your body couldn't sustain it.

Take care of yourselves. Learn to be selfish if you need to be. Tell those closest to you what you need in order to get through this time. You will survive, whether you like it or not. We're here if you need us, your compassionate friends.

Teenage Grief and the Subject of Anger

Expressing anger is not something that most of us are given permission to do while growing up. We are often told to go to our room or calm down. We buy the message that anger is inappropriate and are seldom given examples of how to vent anger in a way that does not hurt someone else or ourselves.

Anger is a very human response to grief. We may be angry at ourselves, the doctor, God, or friends who have family members that we no longer have. We can even be mad at our loved one for dying and leaving us alone to deal with life without them.

It has been said that depression is often a result of anger turned inward. If we intellectualize or minimize our anger, it will not go away by itself. Our suppressed anger may find an avenue in situations that appear to be unrelated to the death.

Some people have found that anger can be safely expressed in the following ways: writing an angry letter and tearing it up, screaming into a pillow, punching a pillow or mattress, scribbling with red crayon until you get tired, exercising -running, bicycling or boxing, etc. While doing the above, verbalize either out loud or silently, the anger you are feeling. Verbalizing is an effective way of focusing your anger where it belongs.

Journaling or drawing can also release anger. At the top of a sheet of paper, you might want to write, "I am angry because.. and respond to this question with short sentences or sketches. Writing brings responses from the intellect and drawing can bring deeper responses from the heart, so think about doing both.

If you have mastered the art of meditation and are accustomed to being still in the silence, this can be an opportunity to look deeply into the source of your anger. Often we are angry for reasons that are quite different from what we originally thought. Prayer is also a great healer. Prayer and meditation are thought, by many, to be methods or avoiding angry thoughts and feelings. On the contrary, prayer and meditation provide an opportunity to look directly into the face of anger in an environment that produces clarity and direction. If you are not feeling anger at this time, respect that. There is not a magic formula that says you have to be angry while grieving. Anger is simply a common and frequent response to grief for many.

Follow your heart and allow yourself to grieve in your own way and on your time.
