Father's Day

Just as Mother's Day was difficult and sad for bereaved mothers - Father's Day will be very difficult for bereaved fathers. Many articles in this newsletter have been written by bereaved fathers.

I hunt, fish, camp, drive a fast car, play football, basketball and baseball, I am tough! I went to war. I am the toughest two-legged mammal alive. I am a MAN.

While our son was still in the hospital, I cried alone so my wife wouldn't see me. At home I cried alone, in the shower, in the back yard, anywhere but in front of my wife. I had to be a rock. After our son died, I helped support my wife in the best way I knew how. I was a rock for her to lean on. I was invincible. The rock caused more trouble than good. Soon, we were not talking or getting along with each other and I didn't understand why. My wife became angry. She told me, "You act like you don't love J.J." (because I didn't appear to be grieving).

The rock became mush. I then realized what I had done. I had played MAN instead of just being a father and a husband. You see, a mother does not need a rock with no emotions. She needed me to show her that I did indeed love our son and that I was hurting after his death, and that I did cry. My wife comforted me later that night, after we had talked. I cried, she cried. We both needed it. I found out that it was good for me to cry and let my wife help me. I am MAN. I am a grieving man, who now, does not mind crying in front of anyone. I cry for myself and for our son, J.J.

A Gentle Reminder to Go on Living

Finally, I have a platform to complain, vent, accuse, and generally make my thoughts known on how wrong everything is. The only problem with that is that I find myself with little to complain about. I have a wonderful wife and two great kids. I get along with my parents and in-laws. I'm good at my job and like my neighbors....

Don't get me wrong. I could search for things to complain about. My dog won't obey me and has since trained my kids not to obey me. There is a petition circulating my neighborhood requesting that my truck be banned from the streets during daylight hours. Then, of course, there are the real things I could complain about the war with Iraq, drought, forest fires, the economy, the presidential election campaign, and so on. And last, but certainly not least, my infant son dying three months ago.

To be honest, not much else has mattered since my son died. I miss him terribly, but I don't feel right complaining. I've always been told that life wasn't fair. Until my son's death, I hadn't experienced how unfair. it could be. I have always been the happygo-lucky, loud-talking, fun-loving, self-deprecating sharp wit (or is that halfwit?). I'm the jolly fat man who is quick with a joke and quicker with a beer. The happy Daddy, ready to wrestle, play trucks or Barbie. I'm a lot like Santa—only not as organized or as generous.

Or I should say, I was. What surprised me and helped my shattered heart was the generosity and compassion shown by almost everyone I knew. The support my wife and I received enabled us to hold our lives together for each other and for our other children. The kind word or open ear goes a long way when recovering from something like this. It's a long process, recovering from the death of anyone you love, but it is longer when it is a child. It's a journey that we are just beginning, and one that will never end. I know that it will get easier because it can't get any harder.

I often go to my son's grave during my lunch hour from work. I read him the sports page, stressing the

current plight of the Avalanche, hoping for some divine intervention. During one of these sessions, I was sitting under thetree that shades his grave, complaining how unfair it was for a father and son to be separated by six feet of earth. I was most of the way through my diatribe when a bird pooped on my shoulder. I didn't look up because I wasn't sure if he was done yet, but I did scramble to my feet, cursing & threatening: As I stood there griping and wiping, I thought to myself that this was a sign. Not immediately, mind you. I mean, lightning bolts and thunderclaps are traditional signs from the afterlife. Bird poop generally doesn't have any existential significance.

However, the bird bombing was a message from my son. I can see you, rolling your eyes, but I believe. It was my son's way of telling me to get back to being myself. It's all right to mourn and grieve; in fact, it is a must. There is no timetable for grieving, but I need to wipe it off and get back to work.

I'm not so quick to complain about it anymore. Nothing can change the fact that he is gone. If I'm not going to complain about my son dying, I shouldn't be complaining about anything else. Because of my Irish blood and poet's heart, it won't surprise anyone when I raise a glass to toast my angel on occasion. But no longer will I complain about my loss —because I carry him in my heart and in my head. Besides, there are many large geese in the cemetery, and I don't need my son to send me a bigger message.

Father's Day

One of the many mixed feelings a father will have on Father's Day will be one of failure... failure as a protector of his child who has died. The roles of protector and father are synonymous. The father's duty is both to love and to protect his child from harm. A man may intellectually know he did his best; but the child, his care, is still painfully absent on this Father's Day.

Sibling Page

Excerpts from

"Adult Siblings Grief"

Most people misunderstand how deeply adult siblings grieve. If your sibling was older than you, you have shared life with him of her as long as you have had your parents. Even if your sibling was younger, you may not remember life without him or her.

When you sibling died, you not only lost a unique loved one, but you lost-that person's role within the family. It is normal that you and other siblings will try to 'fill in' some of these roles. Some changes may take place quite naturally and easily while others may feel awkward and cause a great deal of conflict with the family.

For some bereaved siblings, the fact that their sibling's death has altered their relationship with their parents is deeply painful. Under the stress of coping with the death of their child, your parents may react to you as though you were still a small child. They may try to comfort you at their own expense, or try to protect you from the reality of death. If this happens, you may need to talk to your parents and offer them some concrete ways they can be supportive of you.

You may find yourself trying to protect your parents from the grief you feel. You may go to great lengths to hide your pain from them. You may take on parental responsibilities in an effort to care for them ending up `parenting your parents'. And if your parents feel you are overprotecting or smothering them, respect their response.

Ultimately, you will forage a new relationship with your parents. Talk with them about what you observe and ask them to share with you how they see you differently. Tell them you want to use these new understandings to build a new, more mature relationship with them.




